Peer Advocacy

What is the Role of a Peer Advocate?

SHARPP's peer advocates offer direct support to survivors of sexual assault, sexual harassment, relationship abuse, stalking and those who care about them. Trained advocates are on call 24 hours, year-round to provide services to survivors including non-judgmental listening and support, education, information, options and resources.

What is the time commitment?

- 35-hour training
- Monthly advocate meetings
- 3 on-call shifts per semester
- Minimum of 1-year commitment

Our Peer Educators

Our peer educators are an interesting and varied group of students who utilize their skills and talents to increase awareness and educate about ending all forms of sexual assault, sexual harassment, relationship abuse, and stalking. The target audience for peer education is UNH students, however, programs and outreach are also available to the greater community including faculty and staff.

- 3 presentations per semester
- Minimum of 1-year commitment
